August is often associated with abundance, harvest, and fruition in both agricultural and spiritual contexts. Throughout the Bible, we find numerous instances where God's provision and blessings are manifested during this time, signifying a season of abundance and great blessings.

In the Gregorian calendar, the month of August holds a special significance with its biblical roots and symbolism. While the term "August" does not appear explicitly in the Bible, exploring the interconnected themes and events recorded within its pages reveal deep spiritual insights and prophetic symbolism.

A Message from Pastor Matthew Cephus

Finding Your Roots

To know one's identity is a pivotal task in life. In our formative years, we may be swayed by who or what others want us to be, leading us to become someone we really are not. The search for our identity is certainly part of the great interest in family history and genealogy as we learn about our ancestors. Sometimes this information is welcome, but sometimes it is not. In the search process, we may discover previously unknown facts about who we are and where we come from that are in conflict with what we thought to be true. For some, this can lead to an identity crisis because we are not the person we believed ourselves to be. Finding your roots can be tricky business. I recall something my friend told me about a question his dad asked his grandfather. He asked why he didn't look up his relatives who happened to live in a different part of the state? His grandfather's reply was very pragmatic: "Either they would be so high-toned that they wouldn't know you, or they would be so poor that they'd want to borrow money." But still, we want to know who we are and where we come from.

When it comes to faith, many people are also in a search process. We are looking for who we really are in life. This becomes more urgent at different points in life: as we grow in our youth; as we leave home and start off on our own; as we settle on a career path; as we marry and have a family; as we retire, cope with aging, and face our own mortality. We can spend a lot of time and energy in life fretting about the identity question as this relates to the big picture of who God is and what is our relationship to Him. We need not worry about this. The good news is that God himself has declared who we are. The wonderful words of the Lord to his people through the prophet Isaiah remind us of this: "But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: 'Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior'" (Isaiah 43:1-3a). "I have called you by name, you are mine." Those are wonderful words! We have been given an identity and a sense of belonging in the Lord. He tells us that not only has He created us, but He has also redeemed us. To redeem, in its original sense, means to buy something back that has been taken from you. So, what does that mean?

If God has created us (and this is what Scripture teaches in Genesis 1-2), then we originally belonged to him. But our identity and belonging as God's own children, created in his own image, were hijacked by a force bent on our destruction. This is what Scripture calls sin; a twisting and perversion of God's original plan and purpose for his creation (of which we are but one part). Our human history has been one constant rebellion against God as we try to make God in our own image with all of the terrible things that have come about through this warped reality. Like genealogy, when we start digging in our history, we may find some pretty ugly things. That is certainly true of our faith history.

Our faith story doesn't end with brokenness and shattered plans. God's plans are not so easily thwarted! In amazing love, God chose to send his only Son on a rescue mission to deliver his creation from destruction and death. Through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, God's own Son, we have been given a new identity. In fact, in Jesus we have been given a new life! In the cleansing waters of Holy Baptism, we are united with Jesus and everything that Jesus has done becomes ours (see Romans 6:1ff.). A great exchange has taken place through which Jesus takes our sin and shame, bestowing on us his righteousness and blessing. This is where our new life and identity begin – in Jesus and what He has done for us.

Finding our roots means that this takes work on our part. We press on, we persevere, even when the work we are doing doesn't seem to produce any results. It is big-picture stuff as the pieces slowly come together. The same is true in our faith story. We press on and persevere, even when it feels like there's nothing to show for it. We trust that "he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion in the day of Christ Jesus" (Philippians 1:6). Knowing who we are begins with knowing Whose we are. The same word that God spoke through Isaiah He speaks to us today: "I have called you by name, you are mine."

Jesus' transforming presence

"But Zacchaeus stood up and said to the Lord, 'Look, Lord! Here and now I give half of my possessions to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody out of anything, I will pay back four times the amount.' Jesus said to him, 'Today salvation has come to this house, because this man, too, is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost'" (Luke 19:8-10 NIV).

Who knew, all those kids sitting in Sunday school were getting a lesson in stewardship! Generations of children have very often heard lessons based on the familiar account of Zacchaeus. The diminutive tax collector's curiosity surrounding the person and ministry of Jesus is what the Holy Spirit used to set him on a collision course for a total stewardship transformation. This transformation, according to the text of Luke 19, is not just about this life. This stewardship transformation is about eternity as well!

Remember the story: Zacchaeus was a tax collector. Do not think of friendly neighborhood IRS agents. This was more like a toll booth operator, but the governing authorities did not set the toll. They would contract men to staff roadside booths and tax the commerce that was passing along the road. This was an enterprise full of greed and graft. The tax collectors would take as much as they could and only pass on a portion to the government. The rest did not go into the community chest either! It went into the pocket of the tax collector.

This is why the people had such disdain for Jewish tax collectors. They were seen as both crooks and traitors. They were crooks in that they extorted their compatriots and others in the toll process. But worse, they were seen as traitors because their efforts supported the occupying Roman authorities. That is the real reason that the people would not make way so that short Zacchaeus could see Jesus.

For this reason, he runs ahead and climbs a tree. He had heard all the stories. He wanted to see this Jesus with his own eyes. Mercy is on display. This hated crook and traitor gets a direct audience with Jesus — at Jesus' own request! Jesus invites Himself to Zacchaeus' house. This is where the transformation is about to take place!

Notice how Jesus does it. He does not preach a three-week sermon series, nor does He ask Zacchaeus to make a pledge. There is nothing programmatic about Jesus' approach. But Zacchaeus is completely transformed! The transforming force is the very presence of Jesus!

Direct time with Jesus takes a crooked, selfish, criminal and makes him the most faithful steward.

This new life of stewardship is marked by the promises made. First, he gives half of his ill-gotten gains to the poor. These are people whom he would not have defrauded at all! Yet, after spending time with Jesus, they are His first concern. Only after this does he double the requirement of the Levitical law on fraud. And what does Jesus say is the result? Salvation!

Doing the acts of stewardship does not save. Rather, the faith in Jesus that is created by the Holy Spirit is what saves! This is critical for us to confess. Failed stewardship can and will cut you off from God. The only antidote for failed stewardship is the presence of Jesus.

We do not need to run ahead and climb a tree for this presence of Jesus. He makes Himself available to us every week in the Divine Service. He speaks His Word of invitation to us in the pages of Holy Scripture. This, and this alone, transforms us from sinner to saint, from owner to steward of all that belongs to the Lord.

Do you want to become a more faithful steward? Spend more time with Jesus. Make the Divine Service a weekly priority. Feast on Christ's body and blood weekly! This is the great gift that brings salvation from God's House to yours!



Pastors; deaconesses; Lutheran school teachers; directors of Christian education, Christian outreach and family life ministry; parish musicians. Remember God's work through the Synod's church workers as you pray:

- **1.** with thanksgiving for the many dedicated church workers in the LCMS, who share in our joys and sorrows. Ask the Lord to comfort and defend them from every assault of the devil.
- **2.** for the Synod's pastors, that they would hold fast to the Word of God and find strength to continue preaching God's truth in an increasingly anti-Christian culture.
- **3.** for the Synod's deaconesses. Pray that they would be equipped with all things needful to love and serve people in every situation.

- **4.** that God would bless the work of directors of Christian education, as they develop educational ministries for children, youth, adults and families.
- **5.** for the Synod's directors of Christian outreach, that God would guide their efforts to support a congregation's or organization's outreach and evangelism work.
- **6.** for directors of family life ministry. Ask that God would guide their vital work to strengthen the families in our congregations.
- **7.** for teachers and administrators in Lutheran schools, that they would model Christ-like behavior

for students and incorporate the Gospel message into each and every day.

- **8.** for directors of parish music, that they would find joy and satisfaction in their work of enhancing the worship life of the church.
- **9.** for the Synod's commissioned lay ministers, who work under a pastor's guidance to support a church's efforts in evangelism, Christian education, parish administration and other areas that are God-pleasing.
- **10.** for missionaries, who leave home and family to work in faraway lands. Ask God to give them strength, wisdom and protection as they do His work.
- **11.** for those involved in Specialized Pastoral Ministry, who serve the ill, imprisoned, aging, troubled and isolated. Give thanks for their service to people in the midst of tragedy or crisis.

- **12.** for military chaplains, who put themselves in harm's way to minister to members of our armed forces. Ask God to keep them safe as they share Christ's love with our servicemen and women.
- **13.** for the health and wellbeing of all church workers, that they would utilize opportunities for rest and renewal.
- **14.** with thanksgiving for every person who volunteers in a congregation as an elder, an usher, a Sunday school teacher or in another capacity. Praise God that He calls His people to support full-time church workers in a variety of ways.
- **15.** with thankful hearts for the blessings God gives to His people through full-time church workers. These faithful men and women care for us, pray for us and teach us the Word of God.

"The Church is the congregation of saints [Psalm 149:1] in which the Gospel is purely taught and the Sacraments are correctly administered. For the true unity of the Church it is enough to agree about the doctrine of the Gospel and the administration of the Sacraments" (Augsburg Confession VII).

Remember God's work through the Church as you pray:


- **16.** with thanksgiving to God for raising up voices in every age and generation as He continues to call people to the Gospel of Jesus Christ.
- 17. that God would raise up in our own time faithful pastors and church workers who will preach Jesus Christ crucified and risen, for the edification of His people and for the sake of those not yet of the faith.
- **18.** with thanksgiving that God does His bidding through unworthy and unlikely people. Pray that He would keep us from thinking more highly of ourselves than we ought and keep us focused on the proclamation of the Gospel.
- **19.** that God would give us faith so that we may not fear in times of trouble nor fall away in times of prosperity.
- **20.** for the Holy Spirit and the wisdom that comes down from above to be given to us, so that

God's Word may not be bound but have free course and be preached to the joy and edification of Christ's holy people.

- **21.** that the Church would work together in God-pleasing unity and that their joint efforts would further God's kingdom.
- **22.** for Concordia Seminary, St. Louis; Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Ind.; and other institutions that prepare servants for the Church, that they would properly prepare men and women to serve God and His Church.
- **23.** with thanksgiving for every person and organization that supports the work of the Church. The prayers and financial support of God's people enable the Gospel to be shared at home and around the world.
- **24.** for young people, that the Lord would lead them to serve Him and bless His people.
- **25.** *for us,* that when we are tempted to focus on the things



of the world or on ourselves, God would direct our attention to His Word and will.



- **27.** with thankful hearts to God for sending His Son, Jesus Christ, to die on the cross and rise again so that we might have the forgiveness of sins and the promise of eternal life.
- **28.** that we would joyfully study the Sacred Scriptures as a light to our path and gratefully make







use of the Lutheran Confessions to help us understand and apply the Scriptures.

- **29.** with thanksgiving for shepherds in the Church's history and pastors today, whom God uses to guide His flock.
- **30.** that God would keep all Christians from being led astray by false teachings, and instead bring them to a deeper knowledge of Him.
- **31.** that we all would be given a trust in the saving Gospel and a great passion to spread its joy with others in our lives.
